Clyde Simpson, Observatory Coordinator, Cleveland Museum of Natural History will speak on
"Astronomical Hands-On Activities at the
CMNH"

Clyde Simpson, Observatory Coordinator Clyde has developed a few activities for the classroom and general astronomy instruction. Among them are a scale Earth/Moon model that costs only one cent, and a way of showing how stars form from nebulae using common household materials.

Clyde Simpson (B.A., Geology, Cleveland State University) is Observatory Coordinator of the Ralph Mueller Observatory at the CMNH and has been a member of the Astronomy Department since 1984. Clyde teaches astronomy and geology classes in the planetarium and Museum galleries and maintains the observatory with its 10 1/2 inch Warner & Swasey refracting telescope built in Cleveland in 1899. He leads field trips of astronomical interest, including several to view total eclipses of the Sun, and monitors sunspots on a daily basis for the American Association of Variable Star Observers.

Observatory Report

Description for Budget items listed in the Jan Newsletter:

Door for Privy: The privy door is corroding from the inside out. The door is difficult to open due to warping of the door and frame. \$200

Perimeter Boarding for the Roof Roll-Off Structure: The perimeter boarding has become rotted and detached from the main structure and needs to be replaced and painted. \$150

Hand Controller for the 14" Telescope: The hand controller for the 14" telescope has displayed stubborn behavior when entering commands. Cleaning the controller should help the performance of this device. However, since the device has high mechanical demand, the observatory staff recommends we obtain a spare. In addition, the future of Meade Instruments is uncertain. Without the hand controller, there is no way to control the telescope, even manually. \$150

Miscellaneous Maintenance: The Observatory Staff recommends a miscellaneous maintenance fund of \$25/month to handle small invoice items such as light bulbs, fasteners, logbooks, keys, electrical supplies, etc. \$300

Tool Kit for Observatory: The tool kit we currently have at the observatory is lacking the required tools necessary to perform routine and non-routine maintenance tasks. The Observatory Staff is recommending we purchase a tool kit so we can perform these maintenance tasks. Often during a star party, a club member requests a tool to repair a telescope or astronomical accessory. In most cases, the observatory tool kit is inadequate to assist with the member's problem. \$100


