
Observatory Report

Without the existence of technology, the event that will occur on February 15th would go unnoticed by every creature on Earth. Asteroid 2012 DA14 will pass within 20,000 miles of Earth.

That's pretty close; that's inside the orbit of geosynchronous satellites. Only the slightest deviation in orbit of the 45 meter rock would bring the asteroid into collision course with Earth and release energy equivalent to a 3 megaton nuclear blast. This event would be on the same order of magnitude as the impactor that created Meteor Crater in Arizona. Not even close to an extinctor, but large enough to get world news coverage for many weeks or months. 2012 DA14 won't hit Earth on this orbit, but stirs our imagination of what could happen. I remember the impact of Shoemaker-Levy 9 into Jupiter during July 1994. Astronomers before the impact almost universally stated there would not be much to see. One astronomer predicted a "cosmic fizzle" while another made the analogy of a mosquito running into a battleship; still other astronomers thought the event would not even be visible in

large observatory telescopes. Well boy, they were wrong! All week I watched from Fitchville, Connecticut through my 10" telescope, viewing huge black blotches created by each impact; slowly coming into view as Jupiter rotated. I cannot express the excitement I felt watching this event. For a week, a series of 21 cometary fragments pounded Jupiter coinciding with absolutely pristine Connecticut skies. The most memorable impact was the "triple whammy"; three large impacts separated by about 10 hours, the time it takes Jupiter to rotate on its axis, thereby causing the fragments to

hit Jupiter in the same spot. What a sight! Well, 2012 DA14 won't put on a show as good as Shoemaker-Levy 9; it would have to hit Earth to do that. In fact, it won't even be visible from North America at closest approach. Singapore will have the best view at closest approach. Hopefully some Asian astronomers will capture a fleeting glimpse of the asteroid to share with the rest of the world.

For Sale: I believe I'm the second owner of this very clean Takahashi NJP mount with Temma 2 goto. I believe the specs are 5 arcsecond p-p PE (no PEC) and 60-65 pounds conservative capacity. I've never had it outside except in the observatory. It includes all standard accessories (three 14 pound painted counterweights, DC cable, PC cable, autoguider cable, 4 button handbox as in photo, fixed-height wood tripod) plus lots of purchased accessories - aftermarket Losmandy-compatible saddle, "beer can" counterweight bar extension, polar scope illuminator, Tak 24VDC power supply. I'll probably add items to the list as I think of them. This has been in the observatory for a few years and although it performs very well for me, it's time to stir things up in there and play with something different.

I will package VERY well and ship at buyer's expense (CON US only) but for the buyer who can and will travel to pick this up near Akron, Ohio I will throw in some more expensive accessories: a wheeled Scopeguard case and at least two more 14 pound counterweights. Between those bonus items and the shipping costs, that's a pretty good incentive! It's worth it to me to avoid the hassle of packaging and shipping. I won't ship the case under any circumstances but it'll be available for sale (pick up only) if it remains after the sale. Same for the extra counterweights.
