

Observatory Report

On May 20th we had an outreach program at the observatory with Cub Scout Pack 3339. This event was rescheduled due to weather and this time

the observing conditions were excellent. About twenty scouts and parents attended the event. Scout Master Scott Rader presented ACA with a \$50 donation at the star party. Thanks to Lew Snodgrass and John Shulan for their help at this event.

Our telescope seminar was canceled due to severe weather on June 4th. We decided to have a star party the following day since the weather forecast was very good. Jason Shinn reported Sunday morning that a supernova had been discovered in M51, The Whirlpool Galaxy. A French amateur astronomer, Stephane Lamotte Bailey discovered the supernova on May 31st. Its brightness was reported to be around 14th magnitude. After several e-mails throughout the day, the Supernova Team was assembled: Mark



Kochheiser, Ed Howe, Gary Smith, Mary & Ed Pickelsimer, Bob Benedict, Gregg Crenshaw, Ann & Russ Farrell, Fred Fry, Jason Shinn, Rick Burke, and Ron Kalinoski. At 845pm, the team arrived at the observatory with telescopes, star maps and cameras, and a desire to view the supernova up close and personal.

Luck finally came our way with perfect sky conditions and M51 located near the zenith at prime observing time. Since extended twilight is a phenomenon this time of year, we gazed at a thin crescent Moon, Saturn, and The Great Hercules Cluster until about 11pm. Then we slewed the 14" telescope to

M51. With detailed star maps at our side, we located the exact position of the supernova within the galaxy and there She was! A bit faint and fleeting, only seen with averted vision using the Meade 40 mm Superwide eyepiece. Several of us verified the observation. Rick Burke brought out his 31mm Nagler to see if it would enhance the image. Wow! Yes, a step change in image quality! The observer could easily lock-on to the supernova and hold it in sight for any length of time. The \$550 eyepiece was worth its price for that one observation. This was the first visual observation of a supernova for each member of the group. Next, we setup to image the supernova. After some short exposures to position the galaxy in the center of the frame, Rick Burke set the camera for a three-minute exposure. You could feel our anticipation after the camera shutter finally closed. And there it was, beautiful, just as we visually observed the star position within the spiral galaxy. It was about 1am and the Supernova Team had been slowly shrinking in size. The last few holdouts continued to take more exposures and until finally around 2am, we shutdown the operation. What a great night! Still have a Supernova High!


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
